

# DEAR FRIENDS,




Luke Lippincott (a.k.a. "Snow Leopard") and his trusty sidekick, Diesel, joined us in July of 2015!

Sunset Marina was busy with 172 summer campers who kept on learning even when school was out! Students picked up trash at a local park (scavenger hunt style), learned about the history and mission of LL&W and took educational boat rides exploring the many facets of the Mississippi River.



### **GUEST SPEAKERS**

When not on the barge, our educators give in-school and community presentations. Last year, we were excited to visit 38 cities in 7 states reaching 6,147 participants!

#### STUDENT EDUCATIONAL WORKSHOPS

Our floating classroom has proven to be an unforgettable space where students build an instant connection to the river. Teachers report regularly that their students are still talking about their field trip days, weeks and even YEARS later! In 2017, we hosted 42 student workshops, reaching 1,299 participants from 10 cities and 4 states. With the addition of a river cleanup as one of the 8 class options, students have participated in an amazing service learning opportunity by collecting 24,499 pounds of trash!

#### **EDUCATOR WORKSHOPS**

On the banks of the Mississippi, in Rock Island, IL, LL&W hosted 20 teachers from National Agriculture in the Classroom, a program focused on providing information and lesson plans on ag education to teachers and community members. Workshop participants learned about problems (and solutions) facing our river systems in relation to farming. We feel it's important to educate the younger generation on what goes into producing the food on their plates and get people excited about farming...and Ag in the Classroom does just that!



# RIVER Cleanups

## **Community Cleanups**

To further our ongoing watershed conservation efforts. the LL&W crew hosted a total of 77 community cleanups in 8 states, along 5 rivers. With the help of 1,940 hardworking volunteers, we were able to remove a total 324,034 pounds of garbage. With the addition of 96 crew and excavator cleanups we were able to remove 193,894 pounds, for a total of 517,929 pounds in



2017. Welcomed by amazing people and organizations in these often small-but-mighty river towns, life on the barge doesn't get any better than this! SIDE NOTE: The tour was temporarily put on hold in September as we detoured to help out in Houston - see "Hurricane Harvey" for more on that.




Created in 2010, the Great Mississippi River Cleanup (GMRC) project is a great way for people to bring the LL&W concept to their own turf. Communities host local cleanups on the Mississippi River, with the guidance and supplies provided by LL&W. This year, 448 volunteers hosted 6 events in 5 different states, freeing the river from 30,033 pounds of debris! We are beyond appreciative of the families, individuals, groups and businesses that volunteered, with special recognition for those who took on the site coordinator roles. You are ALL river cleanup rock stars!!











Our Adopt-A-River Mile (AARM) program began in 1999 along the Mississippi River, modeling after the successful Adopt-A-Highway program. In 2014, after years of success, we expanded this program to encompass all of our nation's waterways. Getting the rivers clean and keeping them clean are two different challenges we face, and the AARM program is one of the leading forces in sustaining our efforts!

# ALTERNATIVE SPRING BREAK

We arrived in Memphis, TN for the 7th consecutive year of cleaning Lake McKellar. The newly installed trash booms should help manage incoming garbage if maintained properly. Along with the LL&W crew, we had 121 students from 12 different colleges across six states. Together we were able to remove a whopping 119,349.5 pounds of garbage, over 30,000 pounds more than the previous year!

We are happy to report that we were able to distribute more than 106,000 oak tree saplings in 18 states thanks to approximately 1,300 local volunteers. Several volunteer-driven events were organized to maintain our nursery, plant acorns, harvest trees and package and distribute the saplings. More than half of all MTP volunteers attended our tree wrapping weekend extravaganza, wrapping tens of thousands of trees for distribution!

After giving away our ONE MILLIONTH tree in 2016, we were asked, "What happens now?!" quite frequently. While we did complete the project's namesake, there was never any doubt in our minds that we would forge ahead with our mission to enhance the watershed by planting native trees and removing invasive plants. 2017 was a huge success and we're looking forward to another great year for MTP, the perfect complement to our river cleanup efforts!



# RESTORATION PROJECT

In 2017, Living Lands & Waters began the I-80 Restoration Project with help from local arborists to remove the trees affected by the March 2016 tornado. More than 40,000 motorists see this 28-acre parcel every day as either their first or last impression of the state of Illinois.

After clearing the first 13 acres of downed trees and invasive honeysuckle, oats were planted as a cover crop to add nutrients to the soil to help prepare the ground for the native prairie that will be planted in 2018.

Thank you to our 432 volunteers that aided LL&W in the removal of invasive species at the I-80 Restoration Project, and other project locations, in the state of Illinois this year.
