


DEAR FRIENDS,





STUDENT EDUCATIONAL WORKSHOPS

LL&W had the pleasure of hosting 1,309 students and teachers at 35 workshops aboard our floating classroom on the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers. Along with barge workshops, we focused our efforts on outdoor education by leading workshops at a forest preserve that is near and dear to our hearts - Illiniwek! Through active exploration and games, LL&W led lessons on invasive species, plastic pollution and the importance of pollinator habitats. Thanks to our friends at the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, we were also able to offer mussel education to students!

EDUCATOR WORKSHOPS

LL&W hosted 30 teachers from Illinois and Iowa affiliated with National Geographic's Geo-Inquiry workshop for educators. LL&W's educators highlighted plastic pollution in our rivers and oceans and provided teachers with the tools to bring river education into their classrooms. Along with learning about the invasive, non-native species silver carp, participants ate fried silver carp prepared by LL&W's Master Chef, Andrew Layer. Fun was had and things were learned!


SUMMER CAMPS

11 summer camps in Rock Island, IL focused on community garbage pick-up, interpretive boat rides on the Mississippi River, plastic pollution and other educational activities.


GUEST SPEAKERS
